

Protect the village's future by voting 'yes' in referendum

Residents are being urged to vote in favour of the Neighbourhood Plan at the forthcoming village referendum to ensure it is taken into consideration by Dacorum Borough Council in all future planning applications.

The Kings Langley Neighbourhood plan was successfully passed through the examination stage early this summer, and the Examiner's Report has been accepted in full by the Parish Council. The plan will now go to Dacorum Borough Council's (DBC) Planning Committee for acceptance and then proceed to a village referendum which is expected to be held this Autumn.

A successful vote will ensure the Plan plays a key role in influencing the style of development in the village. The overarching vision of the plan - on which work began in 2019 - is to preserve and enhance

what parishioners most value about Kings Langley in line with the priorities suggested by the Parish Plan Survey. This includes retaining the village status of Kings Langley, environmental action, greenbelt, proximity to open countryside, canal, woods and common, its thriving high street and strong sense of community.

The Community Infrastructure Levy is a charge that local authorities can impose on new developments in their area, with the money raised being used for infrastructure that the Council and communities want. At present Kings Langley Parish Council is given 15% of the levy by DBC but, when the Plan is adopted, this rises to 25% so gives us more resource to carry

out projects that residents would like to see in the village.

John Morrish, who is leading the project on behalf of the Parish Council, said 'This has been a long journey through many consultations but I am happy that we have a Plan that will work for our village over the plan period from now until 2038. My huge thanks to the team who worked with and stayed with the project - Andrew Levy, John Ingleby, Eric Martin, Chris Pichon and James Markham

'Look out for the Referendum in Autumn – and please take the time to vote as the more votes we have, the more we can prove that the Plan is representative of our village needs.'

It's the 40th anniversary of the Abbots Langley Tough Ten next month. This year's race date is Sunday 2 October.

And what a day it was. The recent weather with storms and showers, heat and humidity resulted in some truly remarkable gardens around the village both in terms of plants, shrubs and trees, and fruit and vegetables – the latter notably on the allotments at Red Lion Lane and Sunderlands Yard.

'The amount of time and effort that everyone has devoted to their garden or allotment large or small was truly astonishing,' explained Ian. 'Although this was my first year, it was a truly enjoyable day – and the natives were very friendly.'

That said, it made the issue of judging the competition a particularly difficult

one this year. 'We wrestled with the results over coffee and cake at Sunnyside's coffee shop in Hemel,' added Alan. 'We'd like to have given all the gardens and allotments we saw a prize, but it would have made the presentation evening at Kings Langley Cricket Cub on 21 October a bit too crowded!'

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School's application for all-weather 3G sports pitch

Kings Langley School (KLS) is seeking support from the local community for a muchneeded all-weather 3G sports pitch, as it looks to get its grant application approved.

The school must demonstrate the concept has the backing of the village and surrounding area to ensure the grant gets the green light.

The Football Foundation has begun undertaking technical surveys on the school site, as well as all the relevant due diligence. The planning application is expected to be submitted in the autumn, all of which is running alongside the grant funding process.

Diane Bell, Deputy Head at KLS, who is overseeing the project, said 'The quality of the grass areas at the back of the site is poor during the winter months with the pitches becoming waterlogged. Local sports clubs who use the pitches frequently have to cancel matches and reschedule due to the inconvenience. We are working closely with Kings Langley Football Club and Chipperfield Corinthians who are fully supporting the project.'

The school has worked hard to be able to provide funding to assist the application to the Football Foundation. Donations from businesses and individuals in and around Kings Langley towards the pitch are being welcomed by the school's management.

Diane added 'Our thanks must be extended to both Kings Langley Parish Council and Councillor Richard Roberts who have both donated funds to the 3G project. Some of these funds will be utilised to break down barriers to participation and a football boot bank will be placed on the pitch so that anyone can borrow a pair of football boots that will enable them to play on the surface.'

Time to welcome back The Old Palace

Following a month's closure for much-needed renovations and improvements, the new landlords Russell and Celeste are welcoming customers to their new venture.

Standing opposite the site of Kings Langley's medieval palace, parts of the pub date back to 1642. It was licensed to sell ales in the 1800s and is the second oldest pub in the village. The oak-beamed bar now sports new upholstery, new chairs, tables and lighting and has been opened up to show off the characterful old fireplace.



'We have plenty of ideas for the future'. enthused Celeste. 'We are currently serving light lunches but we'll be starting to add hot food soon. We'll begin with Sunday roasts and then extend the cooked meals offer to Fridays and all weekends. There are plans for guizzes, music nights and special food events,' she said. 'Halloween has always been a popular time so we'll maybe have a hog roast or barbecue with spicy cocktails.'

They aim to open the upstairs as a restaurant, but there's still a lot of work to be done before that area can be put to use. Although never having run a pub before, Russell and Celeste have plenty of retail experience between them and are certainly not short of enthusiasm!

'We'd like to give locals their pub back for too long passers-by have thought it was closed,' said Russell.

The village market – the name conjures up an image of quaintness with village stallholders selling their produce with local people from the surrounding area to purchase the best, freshest, and up-todate. Indeed our market in Kings Langley has a long and ancient pedigree, though regrettably not an unbroken one.

On 12 February 1290, King Edward I granted the village its first charter to hold a weekly market each Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of Whitsun Week.

The weekly market was held in the meadow above the village, on what became known as New Chipinge, now the High Street. Once a royal charter had been granted, it afforded the village protection from rival markets as a nearby rival market could not open on the same days. Moreover, the charter allowed the inhabitant's priority in selling over 'foreigners,' ie non-residents, from other villages and towns.

Historians don't know precisely why the market and fair at Langlei failed, but we do know that by the summer of 1320, neither market nor fair was taking place. Given the date, it is possible to surmise that the catalyst for its failure had a lot to do with the 'little ice-age' of the period, as well as the dramatic crop failures and the great famine in the years 1315-1321.

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The market was given permission to resume in 1347, but seven months later the first reports of the Black Death were recorded in England.

Guardians of a food bank in the village are appealing for residents to add donations to their weekly shop as standard in a bid to ensure those in need can still access the service.


The All Saints Food Bank, which has been operating since 2020 and is open to anyone without appointment, has seen dwindling supplies over the summer, and organisers fear it is being forgotten.

Ingrid Allen (right) said 'We've seen enormous generosity from Kings Langley residents and people in the wider local area before, during and since the pandemic but we are approaching what will arguably be the hardest time in recent memory for many people and it's essential the food bank stays open.

With the cost of living crisis and winter on the way there will be more people than ever before in need of help. I know everyone is being affected one way or another by the enormous strain on budgets, but if each of us could add just one or two extra bits to our weekly shop as a course of habit, it would have a hugely significant impact on the food bank.'

As well as dried and non-perishable food the bank tries to offer other essentials such as soap, shower gel, shampoo, sanitary products, and general house cleaning products. Baby supplies including nappies and formula are also very welcome. The church is open every day for donations to be made, and for those in need to visit and make use of the bank.

However, by supporting our friends Liz, Su and Caroline, we might be able to help raise more funds for Prostate Cancer UK so that other men are more aware of what to look out for, less embarrassed to discuss issues with their GP, more likely to find any cancers earlier, and then more likely to come out the other side of the treatments successfully.'

Kings Langley says 'No!'

The consultation period for the proposed Rectory Farm housing development has now closed, with 150 local residents getting in touch to share their concerns.

Kings Langley Parish Council (KLPC) voted unanimously to object to the application,' explained Howard Button, Chairman of Kings Langley Parish Council. 'The village said a massive 'No' to this development.'

The next stage of the process is for the relevant Planning Officer at Dacorum Borough Council to write a report recommending approval or refusal. The application will then go to

Will Rectory Farm set a disastrous precedent for our village?

Kings Langley is a large village. Just about. It's a very small step for Kings Langley to become a town. Our village is surrounded by land designated as Green Belt. Such designation was put in place to keep historic villages like ours exactly that - an historic village, not a new town.

The five purposes of the Green Belt are:

- 1. To check the unrestricted sprawl of large built-up areas.
- 2. To prevent neighbouring towns

Dacorum's Development Management Committee (the Planning Committee) to consider, even if the Planning Officer recommends approval. This is because the Parish Council objected to the application and a Councillor will appear in person to renew their objections.

The Committee's decision is final, although it can be Judicially Reviewed if there are legal grounds to do so. If this Committee decide to refuse the

merging into one another.

- 3. To assist in safeguarding the countryside from encroachment.
- 4. To preserve the setting and special character of historic towns.
- 5. To assist in urban regeneration, by encouraging the recycling of derelict and other urban land.

If Rectory Farm, as Green Belt, is allowed to be built on, then how long before landowners of other Green Belt land put in applications to develop? We need to stop the rot now! The only precedent that should be set is preservation of all of our Green Belt.

application, the applicant can appeal to the Planning Inspectorate. Once again, the Parish Council will appear in person at the Planning Inspector's hearing on the appeal to renew their Objections.

Howard added 'The Parish Council would like to see more one- and two-bed housing for local first time buyers and young families. Unfortunately, so-called 'affordable housing' for purchase or rent on these developments is still really only available to those who have sold a house or moved from an even more expensive area of the country.'


