A keen home chef Gold, 51, applied for the show after seeing an advert on Facebook, and made it into the semifinal cooking against ex-professional and social media chefs.

The premise of the show saw contestants prove they could thrive in any environment, with three unique kitchen spaces set over three storeys and almost 50ft high. On the top floor was a state of the art kitchen with all the latest gadgets, in the basement was a basic cooking space filled with bent spoons and old-fashioned equipment, while in the middle was a standard catering kitchen.

culmination of a long-held dream of Gold. 'I must have applied to be on Masterchef six or seven times but never got a response,' he said. 'I applied for Next Level Chef, thinking nothing of it, and then the process rolled on and I got on the show.'

Thankfully nerves were not a big problem for Gold, who for the past 17 years has run his confidence training business, Glow Training. He said 'I teach people how to cope with the pressure of doing presentations to big audiences or dealing with nasty bosses or difficult clients so, I'm not going to lie, that really helped.'

But while many people would be intimidated in the presence of notoriously uninhibited chef Gordon Ramsay, as well as the two co-hosts Paul Ainsworth and Nyesha Arrington, Gold instead drank up the advice on offer.

'Gordon Ramsay is the most competitive person I've ever met, by a country mile, and all of that persona you see on television – the shouting

and swearing and anger – is borne out of that competitiveness and his drive to win. But it's all completely genuine – which is why he has three Michelin stars!

'As a little home cook from Hertfordshire to get hands-on direction and mentorship from Gordon Ramsay for two and a half weeks was outstanding.'

The series was filmed in London, concluding at the end of last year. And now it's over, Gold has started to turn his hobby into an income stream by offering private dining experiences, cooking in people's homes.

'I've cooked for a couple celebrating a birthday,' he said, 'as well as a party for 15 locally. I've had dozens of inquiries so it's a growing local business. I'm currently just seeing what comes from the experience and exposure of the show.'

And Gold, who lists the Alford Arms and Marchmont Arms as two favourite local eateries, hasn't ruled out opening his own restaurant in the area.

'I've always had a little dream of opening my own place,' he said. 'When the old Eagle pub was up for sale I was talking to some investors to try and buy it but for one reason or another it didn't happen.

'At the moment I'm looking for some venues to host pop up restaurants so I can test the water and try out some menus. Maybe in the future that will become something bigger.'

Sarah Burgess and her family set up a not for profit called *Just1bag2020* three years ago while living in Boston, Massachusetts, and before long their family project had captured the imagination of more than 4,200 people from 45 different countries across every continent – including Antarctica.

Between them the supporters of the concept have collected more than 50,000 bags of rubbish from their immediate environment.

After moving back to the UK last summer Sarah, her husband Phil and children Poppy and Toby, are launching their next campaign: *#23in2023*.

They are looking for 23 schools from around the world to organise litter picks, proving that everyone can make a difference, starting at a young age. *#23in2023* would spotlight schools, inspiring the next generation to take care of their community and environment, and would be showcased on the initiative's website and social media pages.

Sarah said 'Now we're back in the UK we're keen to keep the ripple effect going and get more schools involved, locally and overseas. We've seen how much children love taking care of their environment and how impactful it can be to show them that people all over the world are doing the same. If 23 schools get 100 people involved that's 2,300 people making a big difference to their local community. We'd love to have local schools from Kings Langley and SW Herts get involved!'

Each school that registers to organise a *#just1bag2020* clean up will be

included on the #23in2023 website and profiled on its social media pages. They will also be offered support with motivational videos, posters and suggestions for their clean up, and each school will be given a number so they know they're part of something bigger.

Rotary Sleigh proves resounding success

Residents dug deep in response to the annual tour of the Rotary Santa Sleigh, raising over £17,000 in the run up to Christmas. A presentation evening at Leverstock Green Cricket Club was held last month where donations were made to the 25 charities that assisted with the street-to-street collections.

Thanks to the generosity of local people, charities including Kings Langley FC, Sunnyside Rural Trust and Waterways Experiences received £350 each.



With the continued expansion of existing facilities and the major plans for an increasing number of new studios under development, our county looks set to become a hub for the whole of the UK's internationally-acclaimed creative media film industry.

We have already seen the growth of Warner Bros. Studios in Leavesden since its initial opening in 1994. Starting with *James Bond: Golden Eye*, it has become our local centre for filming, including the most successful series of all time – all eight of the *Harry PotterTM* films were shot at the studio. The complex also boasts one of the largest heated underwater filming tanks in Europe.

With around 60% of the people working at the Studios living in the local area, the company has a strong sense of community. It partners with a wide network of local charities, schools and non-profit organisations and has an award-winning education programme. It supports several scholarships, apprenticeship programmes and placements, and has established good working relationships with local schools and universities.

The studio supports with fundraising, volunteering, sponsorship, skills-sharing and donations. There is also a bespoke nursery facility, *The WonderWorks*, providing accessible, affordable and flexible childcare services. It opened in 2020 and is the first dedicated on-site childcare facility at any UK studio. To make sure the local community enjoys the benefits, places are also made available for local children.

Now there are major new developments underway in Waltham Cross and Elstree whilst both Bovingdon and Langleybury Studios are extending their sites.

The largest new complex, Sunset Studios, will occupy about 46 acres in Waltham Cross, with construction beginning this year. With the aim of opening in 2025, it's anticipated it will contribute £300m annually to the local economy and could create up to 4,500 jobs,

Sky has announced its intention to invest in a new 32-acre, state-of-theart TV and film studio at Elstree, and is forcasting the creation of over 2,000 new jobs as well as helping to fuel the local economy.

Elstree Studios, synonymous with filmmaking for the best part of the last century, has long been home to BBC's *Strictly Come Dancing* which has been filmed there since 2013. Two new soundstages have recently been completed, seeing the culmination of a multi-million pound investment in the


Community Awards seek worthy winners

All Saints Church is proudly displaying a new flag on its tower after the family and friends of a late worshipper reinstated the flagpole in his honour.

The late Colin Hunt was remembered at a special dedication when Father James McDonald blessed the new flagpole and flags with holy water. The St George's Cross was raised for all to see on the flagpole's newly located, more visible position on the tower.

The original flagpole was installed to fly the Royal Standard – special permission was granted thanks to the presence of the royal tomb inside the church. This Standard is now housed inside the church close to the royal tomb. The St George's Cross will fly continuously apart from special days when it will be changed to the Union Flag in line with the flags being flown from Government buildings.

Keith Gower, deputy church warden at All Saints who led the project, said 'We're proud to have reinstated the flagpole for the village and we encourage everybody to come and see it as well as the original royal standard. The church is open daily 9.30am - 5pm.'

He told *Village News* 'One evening I came across a flyer asking for volunteer drivers for Good Neighbours. I thought, I have four wheels and a hole in my soul that needs filling. What have I got to lose? Filled with vim and vigour from the 'Uncle Sam'-esque poster, I gave them a call. After a short vetting process, I was armed with a shiny volunteer card and ready to start.

Road safety a priority for Parish Council

A long-awaited crossing spot is being installed in the village to help school children and their parents get to and from school safely.


The School Crossing Patrol – once known as a lollipop person – will be in place on the Hempstead Road, just north of Rectory Lane. There will also be displayed two flashing amber lights, a horizontal sign above saying 'school', and a pictorial illustration above that of children crossing on both approaches.

Meanwhile, at the other end of the village, a Speed Indication Device will be installed on the southbound carriageway of Watford Road. There is already one on the northbound carriageway.

Both initiatives were in response to concerns from residents and the Parish Council was happy to support both schemes. The County Council was also quick to agree to both ideas.

Councillor Alan Johnson said 'The Hempstead Road scheme fits with our desire to reduce parking around the school, including improving the accessibility of a footpath to the school from the Miller and Carter car park for drivers and pedestrians. I also understand sitting in your car with the engine idling produces more pollutants than a moving vehicle which is particularly unhealthy for our children and the environment.'

Councillor Ian Sinclair added 'The second scheme will make it safer for those trying to get to the train station or Wayside Farm, especially as accelerating vehicles make it difficult to assess when it is safe to cross. In addition, work has also improved the condition and white lining on the M25 roundabout this month.'





Spring has sprung at the village library

The Community Library is laying on a busy schedule of events for all ages and interests this spring.
