Coronation caper



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Jill McAdam 1957 – 2023

Popular music teacher and All Saints Church Director of Music Jill McAdam died suddenly on 2 March 2023 at the young age of 65, only a few months before she was due to retire from her teaching career at Abbots Hill School. She taught music to GCSE, religious education, as well as maths in her earlier years there.

Jill, with her husband Brian, moved to the village in 1985, spending their first 20 years at 27 Osbourne Avenue, where they raised their two children, Julia and Jonathan, and then at 8 Langley Hill from 2005

A trained musician with a degree in music from Royal Holloway University, London, Jill was asked to deputise as organist at All Saints Church in 1983.

Several years later Jill became the church's full-time organist and choir director, following the retirement of the incumbent at the time. She only agreed to do this on the basis that she was able to persuade Julia, Jonathan and Brian to join the choir as well! This was a post she was to hold for the next 40 years.

In 1991, the vicar at the time, Peter Stearn, asked Jill to become one of his two Church Wardens for a four-year term. Surprisingly she agreed to this as well, despite her family commitments. She subsequently enjoyed this role immensely, getting to know the strange workings of the Church of England, chairing meetings, and becoming one of the senior faces of All Saints. Amazingly she was to take on this role again 25 years later.

Jill was always eager to help others, particularly those in greatest need. She soon became interested in the local Victim Support charity, initially as a volunteer, then as a coordinator for the Dacorum area. It was whilst doing this that she co-founded the Dacorum Domestic Violence forum, helping set up a safe haven for women in abusive relationships.

Jill was always very sociable, never happier than when having a house full of family and friends. She was



particularly fond of meeting her children's friends and making them feel welcome; perhaps this was because of her affinity with encouraging and comforting truculent teenagers!

Jill's funeral was held at Watford Crematorium on 4 April, followed by a memorial service at All Saints Church where the highlight was the quality of the music in recognition for all that Jill did for the church's musical life. It was a tribute to her popularity that the church was packed out for the occasion with standing room only for late comers! Jill will be fondly remembered, not only by Brian, Julia and Jonathan and their other halves Edward and Dominique, for the loving, fun, and caring person that she was, but also by the wider family and friends who knew her. She will be greatly missed.

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The patrolled crossing on Hempstead Road is now in operation, with local resident Lee Lewis becoming the village's first ever 'Lollipop Lady'.

'I love my job', she told the *Village News*, 'and am enjoying helping
children and adults alike cross the busy
main road in safety'.

It's hoped that this scheme fits with the Parish Council's desire to reduce parking around the school, and improve the accessibility of the footpath between schools and the Miller and Carter car park.



The Manager of Herts County Council's School Crossing Patrol Service said 'The crossing was requested by schools, parents and the Parish Council to reduce congestion, improve air quality and encourage children to walk, cycle and scooter to and from school.

'We want to avoid cars idling their engines around our two schools – idling produces more pollutants than a moving vehicle and it is particularly unhealthy for young children'.

The scheme is currently at its first stage – once electrics are connected to the bollards on the carriageway islands the crossing point will move a few yards to incorporate them.



The salon supports a charity called The Green Salon Collective and recycles cut hair which is used for compost in the planting of new trees. The hair can also be made into hair booms which are used in the ocean to soak up oil spillages and can be used up to 100 times.







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Community Award for brave four year old

Natalie Shiel, 27, passed out at home one morning when she was alone with her

two children. Her daughter, Grace, managed to put into practice an emergency procedure they had rehearsed, alerting a friend and letting paramedics into the house.

Natalie (above with Grace) suffers from postural tachycardia syndrome which can cause blackouts. Natalie said 'This has happened to me before so we've talked to Grace about what to do in an emergency but we always hoped it'd never be something she'd need to do. She knows the PIN number

to my phone – which has my medical ID on it – so she rang my friend who lives nearby.

'The worst thing is she thought I was dead – it must have been so frightening for her.'

Grace made Laila, her one year-old sister, comfortable, sitting her next to Natalie and surrounding her with cushions, before ringing a family friend, Jemma, who came straight round.

While Jemma was with Natalie – who had suspected internal bleeding – the paramedics arrived and Grace was able to let them in and lead them to her mother.

Natalie said 'We're making sure we changed it from something traumatising to something she can be proud of – we've told her how brave she is and how she saved Mummy. It was the paramedics who mentioned this award and suggested we put Grace forward for it.'

Recycling initiative expanded at Kings Langley School

During a presentation made at the Awards, outgoing head students Scarlett Mangan and James Deayn reported how the paper recycling project, introduced at the school last year, was such a success that the equivalent of a skipful of used paper was being sent to Apsley Paper Mill every three to four weeks.

And now two year 12 pupils, Todd Buckingham (pictured above with Scarlett and James) and Juhi Gajjar, have taken over the running of the scheme as leaders of the school's Environment Committee. Under their watch they are ensuring the paper recycling plan continues to run smoothly while introducing plastic bottle recycling bins within the canteen and classrooms.

Todd said 'The school already has external bottle recycling bins but more money is required for the internal plastic bottle bins. This will stop the bottles being placed into the general waste as they are at present.'

Todd and Juhi are working on a plan to raise funds for the bins and aim to involve their fellow pupils in the fundraising.

Todd added 'We hope to further the positive influence on the mindsets of students and the people around them inside and out of school in terms of recycling and contributing to the environment, and to build further on the already successful foundations laid by the Scarlett and James.'

Charity partnership offers help to those in financial crisis

DENS, Liberty Tea Rooms and Christians Against Poverty have announced a partnership to support local people facing financial difficulties.

The Financial Empowerment Programme aims to help those who access the Dacorum Foodbank, or may be at risk of needing the service, to manage their financial situation and provide practical support so they are less likely to need the Foodbank in the future.

Funded by The Trussell Trust, the programme will provide free, on-the-ground support throughout Dacorum to people accessing the Foodbank and other services like community fridges.

Individuals will be offered a range of services including tailored budgeting advice and support, benefits advice, and life skills and money management workshops which will focus on how to maintain a tenancy, manage bills, eat healthily for less and improve wellbeing.

More in-depth debt counselling will be available on a one-to-one basis for those with significant issues, to support them to manage their debt and, long term, become debt free.

Towpath from Hemel to Kings Langley gets Delia says much needed upgrade farewell to

The upgrading of a key section of the Grand Union Canal towpath between Hemel Hempstead and Kings Langley that will make it more accessible and encourage cycling and walking has now got underway.

The work involves a resurfacing of an 800 metre area of the towpath between Nash Mills Lane in Apsley and the River Gade lakes, north of Kings Langley. The section is a popular leisure route and pedestrian link between Kings Langley and Hemel Hempstead.

It's hoped the new high-quality surface will encourage more local people to switch to sustainable modes of transport – a key aim of the Hemel Garden Communities programme as part of the future transformation of the town.

Hemel Garden Communities was awarded government funding for the project through the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities, as part of the Garden Communities Programme. The improvements will be delivered in partnership with Three Rivers District Council, Dacorum Borough Council and Nash Mills and Kings Langley Parish Councils, who have all also contributed financially, with the support of Hertfordshire County Council and the Canal & River Trust.



Ros Daniels, Canal & River Trust director for London & South East said 'Research shows that being next to water improves your mental and physical health and we are committed to making canals more welcoming, safe and clean. This in turn will encourage more people to use them, and enjoy the health and wellbeing benefits of walking and cycling, and being by the water.'

The towpath upgrade work is expected to be completed in July. Public access will be suspended through the site for the duration, with a diversion route in place, although access for leisure activities, such as fishing, will be maintained where possible.

Delia says farewell to choir after 32 years

Chipperfield Choral Society has bid a fond farewell to its musical director after more than three decades at the helm.

Delia Meehan laid down her baton on 1 April after her final performance – of Handel's *Messiah* – after leading the choir for 32 years.

A sold out audience packed into Barbirolli Hall at St.Clement Danes School where Delia and the amateur choir were supported by an orchestra which consisted mainly, though not surprisingly, of friends and former students.

Four vocal soloists – soprano Elizabeth Watts, mezzo Rosemary Clifford, tenor Tom Robson and bass Alex Ashworth – provided wonderful moments of drama and some exceptional musicality.

One member of the choir said 'Delia has an extraordinary ability to make every single member of the choir feel special. She knows everyone personally; and she seems to have an encyclopedic knowledge of not only members of the choir, but their families too. New members are personally welcomed to the choir, creating a warm sense of belonging to a large family.'

GUCE aims to develop renewable energy for 'majority' of KL homes

An initiative that aims to develop renewable energy systems and promote ways to reduce bills is working on a way to provide alternatives to gas heating in Kings Langley.

Grand Union Community Energy (GUCE), a not-for-profit organisation, is exploring a long-used Scandinavian system which heats homes' internal hot water systems by delivering water to a heat-exchange via highly insulated pipes.

These domestic heat exchangers – which are the same size and cost as a conventional gas boiler – have been proven to be highly effective, cutting costs and carbon footprint for households.

Last year, GUCE won a grant to study the possibility of extracting heat from the Grand Union Canal and, while this has not proved possible, it led to the discovery that large volumes of water were historically extracted from old boreholes beneath the Ovaltine site.

If similar boreholes could be drilled opposite the Ovaltine, calculations show that enough energy would be generated to heat a majority of homes in Kings Langley.

Concerns about village development without infrastructure changes

An update from the Kings Langley & District Residents Association.

'There's an line in the National Planning Policy Framework that states "the objective of sustainable development can be summarised as meeting the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs."

With our railway station, proximity to the M25, two major towns and London, it's easy to see why property developers and our two local Borough Councils think Kings Langley is an ideal spot for new housing developments and even a Park & Ride location.

'But with no additional infrastructure, our village is not a sustainable location and more houses will compromise future generations. For example, last year Kings Langley Senior School received 695 applications for 186 places, with children living on the Ovaltine side of the village not getting places. Meanwhile our junior school is 2–3 times oversubscribed and the catchment area is shrinking all the time.

'Since 2020, KL&DRA has calculated that new homes built/under construction/ planning permission granted for totals more than 400, with no additional infrastructure provided. Further Green Belt development at Rectory Farm could add another 135 homes and TRDC's Local Plan could allow another 1.300 new homes.

'We need to stop building new houses on our Green Belt and start providing new infrastructure on what brownfield land we have left available'. For more information and to support the cause visit www.greenbeltmatters.com or the Facebook page greenbeltmatters

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Meet Adam, Kings Langley's own Herald

A Kings Langley resident who is a sovereign-appointed Herald educated visitors to a Kings Langley Local History and Museum Society talk at the Community Library recently.

Adam Tuck – known as Rouge Dragon Pursuivant – is one of just 13 Heralds who, among other duties, take a central role in royal ceremonial events.

Adam gave insights into the extraordinary events in which he was directly involved to mark the funeral of the late Queen Elizabeth II and the proclamation of the new King.

As a Herald Adam has his own office in the College of Arms, within sight and sound of St Paul's Cathedral. He even slept there during the preparation for the funeral in order to be on hand for the rehearsals for the processions in the middle of the night when much of London was asleep.

Adam, who is paid £13.95 a year to be a Pursuivant but has a private practice in heraldry and genealogy, described the physical resilience he needed to draw on to complete the processional miles



encumbered in medieval tabard, tights and stiff shoes, of the requirement to look straight ahead at the back of the person in front, of trying to keep in step, and in exact lines. He talked of the privilege of performing such a role on this unique occasion.


