£2 flat fee to park for a few minutes in our High Street?

Business owners and residents have responded angrily to the news that parking on the High Street could soon be subject to charges.

A public consultation scheduled for February will inform the final decision on the plan to force visitors to pay a flat fee of £2 from 7am until 10pm on all 53 parking bays in the High Street, for a maximum stay of two hours with no return within two hours.

It is feared the move proposed by the new Liberal Democrat administration will drive custom away from Kings Langley High Street and have a negative impact on local businesses.

One resident, who did not wish to be named, said 'I often pop into the village for emergency groceries, post a letter or to drop something at the charity shop but live too far to walk when I'm in a hurry – there's no way I'll do that if I have to pay £2 for the privilege. I'll go on to Sainsburys and save my other errands for when I'm nearer somewhere bigger like Berkhamsted and can make the most of the payment.'



Another added 'I understand this is something that's being rolled out across several other towns across Dacorum but I don't think a one size fits all approach is necessarily right. The two car parks in our village are already at capacity and this will absolutely not help the situation. Businesses have had to deal with rent rises recently so are already on the back foot there – anything which risks reducing custom could be catastrophic.'

Di Hewetson runs a pilates class at the Baptist church hall in The Nap and those attending often report struggles to park. She said 'People find it difficult to park in the free car park in The Nap because it is already full up and so they often use the side residential roads. If these are full too then any parking restrictions could affect my classes. Sometimes we go up to the High Street en masse for a coffee after class which would not work so well if parking charges and

time restrictions are added to the High Street.'

The car parks in The Nap and on Langley Hill are exempt from parking charges as the land on which they are situated was donated to the village on the understanding it remained free to use.

Businesses have also given their reaction to *Village News*, with all vehemently against the move. Jeff Folkins, who runs Dalling & Co Wine Merchant, called it 'a completely unacceptable, impractical and damaging plan' while Sian Turner from Home & Garden called the decision 'short-sighted'.

As Honorary Vice President of Kings Langley Football Club he held a number of roles over the years and was instrumental in the growing success of youth football at the club.

A representative from the football club said 'Alan's immense contribution to the club can never be underestimated. The club will be forever in his debt. Alan touched many lives in his all too brief time with us, and for those of us who were privileged to enjoy his friendship, there will always be a special place for him in our hearts.'

Alan was a familiar figure around the village where he had lived for over 30



years, endlessly cheerful and chatty to everyone he met.

Derry Edgar, Kings Langley FC secretary, said 'I've known Alan as a friend and colleague for over 40 years and I know I speak for everyone at Kings Langley Football Club and the wider football community when I say the world is a poorer place for the parting of a man admired and respected by so many.

'Alan's love and dedication to local football was second only to the love

of his family. He was a huge influence on the football club's youth section, serving with unstinting commitment as both manager and fixtures secretary during the club's fledgling years. I, and many others whose lives he touched so warmly, will miss him hugely as a true friend'

As Honorary Vice President, he served Kings Langley Football Club tirelessly over a number of years, always with his devoted wife, Sian and sons Aaron and Declan as his supporters. Alan's first wife Pat died in 2002 but he is survived by his twin sister Wendy, and half brother Wayne, while his older sister Linda passed away in 2022.

#### In memory of Clive Swan 1949 – 2023


Clive had lived in Kings Langley since the early 1980s. His sudden recent passing leaves a hole in the world of amateur musical theatre. He will be remembered by the many people whose lives he touched, for his passion and love of music and musical theatre.

Clive joined Kings Langley Musical Theatre Company (KLMTC) in 2005 as Musical Director for *My Fair Lady*. He was already well known for his talent not only as a pianist but also as a

Musical Director to many local theatre groups prior to this.

Clive had created his own cabaret group called Night People as well as playing the piano regularly at Sopwell House and working with Kings Langley Players (KLP) on their pantomimes. He stayed with KLMTC for eighteen consecutive shows, his final show being *Hot Mikado* in 2023, and they paid tribute to him for his major contribution to their shows.

Clive sadly died at home in November 2023, following a short illness.

# High Street parking plan

#### 'Unacceptable, impractical and damaging' say businesses

Jeff Folkins, Dalling & Co...

'We have long believed there should be a charge for parking on the high street and the two car parks, but on a graduating scale. Local council has always been opposed which has always left us bemused because we believe that a fair and reasonable parking charge system could really benefit the High Street and council coffers at the same time.

'Claire and I advocate the system used in many towns and villages in which the first 30 minutes or hour is free with charging on an increasing scale from thereafter.

'A sensible system would not deter shoppers from using the high street, but would discourage those who use the free parking as an all day option, especially the commuters that park in the car parks and then walk to the station.'

Sian Turner, Home & Garden...

'What are they trying to achieve? People will simply continue on to Sainsburys or the retail parks. Those stopping for a quick sandwich will be at risk of a ticket and no one will 'pop in' to the village. It's a total joke and I'm completely furious. I feel sad that those

like myself who are new to retail and the village are having their businesses put at risk and not given the best possible chance of success because of such a short sighted decision.

'On top of this, a two hour limit on parking would be a death sentence for the restaurants, hairdressers and beauty places; it's unrealistic to think two hours is enough for an evening out or a hair appointment.'

'I am totally against the plan which is another way for the councils to claw monies in. It's hard enough competing with online business at the moment and this will be a nail in the coffin for the village. And, if the car parks are free, everyone will double park there, when it's bad enough at the moment as train travellers park there as it is so expensive to park at the station.'





Alan Anderson, Kings Langley Borough Councillor, lambasted the proposals...

'Whilst the new administration at Dacorum has arguably already made a right mess of parking charges policy across the Borough, it hadn't occurred to anyone that they would propose implementing parking charges in Kings Langley High Street, starting at £2.

'Their focus had previously been on the two car parks in the village. Having found charges could not be introduced in one of the car parks which had a covenant, they blind-sided everybody by proposing charging in the High Street.

'Having attended a Cabinet meeting to speak against this proposal, not least because of the direct and indirect damage caused by the last business rates hike, we argued this was the last thing our High Street needed. £2 is too much of an added charge for even the shortest of stays, e.g. to have a coffee or a haircut.

'The legal consultation on the administration's proposals for parking charges will take place in February, and will be available from DBC's website homepage. We urge residents to take part in the consultation and will post a reminder to do so on Kings Langley Matters.

# Community Choir as busy as ever

The lead up to Christmas was a busy time for the Kings Langley Community Choir (pictured above). At the start of December they performed at the Christmas Lights Festival in Kings Langley High Street and a week later sang at All Saints Church in support of the Christmas Tree Festival.

Visitors to the festival enjoyed a fine display of Christmas trees decorated by local community groups, and were treated by the choir to two live performances of Christmas songs.

The final Christmas rendition took place at St James' Church Bushey with a programme including many of the numbers that had been sung at the previous two performances in Kings Langley such as White Winter Hymnal, Mary Did You Know and Home for the Holidays, all beautifully arranged by the choir's musical director Becca Wilkins. During the programme, the audience was invited to join in with traditional carols such as Joy to the World and Hark the Herald Angels Sing.

Rehearsals have begun for the 2024 season of performances, the first of which will be at the Beaconsfield Festival of Choirs on 2 March. The format involves 24 choirs performing in four concerts during the day, each singing two or three numbers in a set lasting around 10 minutes. At the end of each concert, the assembled choirs will be invited to sing a specially commissioned piece which this year is based on a classic poem by Rudyard Kipling called *Trees*.

# Building work shuts library

The Community Library is set to close for at least eight weeks, beginning at the end of January, in order to replace the roof. After years of temporary repairs to the leaking roof, the decision has finally been made to replace the roof in its entirety.

The move means the doors will be closed to all members of the public for a minimum of two months, with a contingency of a further four weeks if poor weather or access to materials slows down the work.

Caroline Brankin, chairman of Kings Langley Community Library volunteer committee, said 'Although we are disappointed that we won't be able to provide our usual services we are also excited that our annual problems with leaks will finally end!

'We are very grateful for the support of our Parish Council who represented our library and the public's concerns to the County Council. This has resulted in an excellent outcome for the village.'

The library will update residents with dates of the closure and reopening via posters on the High Street noticeboard and on its Facebook page.




#### KLPC seeks new Clerk

#### Residents Association to celebrate success

Early in 2023, Kings Langley was facing the prospect of major development in and around the village from our two councils' Local Plans, which threatened the very existence of Kings Langley as a village.

Three Rivers District Council (TRDC) were considering 1,273 new dwellings on green belt farm land at Numbers Farm and Kings Langley Estate South, straddling the M25 and effectively merging Kings Langley with Abbots Langley.

Kings Langley & District Residents Association (KL&DRA), with the Three Rivers Joint Residents Association, has worked with TRDC to remove these sites from the Local Plan.

Dacorum Borough Council (DBC) has now removed Rectory Farm, a potential site for 135 new dwellings on green belt, from their Local Plan, and have refused the planning permission lodged by the land owners.

The owners will appeal against that decision, but KL&DRA believe that is now the most crucial battle to win to

'Announcements will be made in January through local media about our free event when we hope to see as many residents as possible come along to hear about our work. We'll provide a welcoming free drink and buffet so we hope to see a full house.'

## New development for Meadowbank

A former Montessori nursery school site in Meadowbank could be converted into a supported living setting, providing four new homes, associated communal facilities and four parking spaces, if plans are approved.

The homes, which are being proposed by Watford Community Housing in partnership with Hertfordshire County Council, will be available for adults in the south-west of the county. The site has been vacant for around six years following the closure of the nursery school, but a planning application will be submitted shortly with a view to work beginning in late 2024.

Howard Button, chairman of the Parish Council, said 'The Parish Council has been lobbying for the building to be repurposed for some time as it is in a prime village location adjacent to All Saints Church. This appears to be a very worthwhile use of the site, although we will need to see the plans in due course.'


