



Headteacher calls on parents to be tough on mobile phone use

A national movement to encourage parents to not give their children a smartphone before the age of 14 is gathering pace, with a community group for Kings Langley School (KLS) parents and prospective parents now live.

Smartphone Free Childhood is an initiative that has rapidly gathered momentum, capturing the imagination of thousands of parents across the country who are interested in preventing smartphone access at a young age.

And now hundreds of community groups have sprung up at both county-level and for parents of individual schools, including KLS.

Village News spoke to David Fisher, headteacher of KLS (inset), who is an advocate for limited phone use and works hard to educate pupils, parents and staff on safe mobile phone use and the risks that come with unlimited internet access.

He told us 'One of the first things I did when I joined the school five years ago was to ban mobile phone use on the premises. I consulted with students, parents and staff and, while it was hard to police at

first, even my strongest challengers are now advocates for the policy. Phones are powerful computers to have in the hands of children, and are an addictive tool for young people. I want school to offer them a break from that.'



But Mr Fisher stressed much of the onus lies with parents to be firm on issues such as phone use. He said 'There certainly needs to be greater safety policies at Government level and from social media companies but until legislation changes we all have a part to play. I can ban phones in school but it's what happens in the home late at night that needs tackling too.

'Parents need to take greater responsibility and be parents not friends in this instance, making tough decisions that will best prepare their children for future life.'

KLS subscribes to a digital platform called Tooled Up Education, a digital library of evidence-based advice and content that parents can access to help them support their children as their independence grows, while the school's website carries extensive

information around digital safety.

Parking petition gathers pace

A petition objecting to plans to introduce car parking charges in Kings Langley High Street has surpassed 2,600 signatures after it ran as the front page story in the last issue of Village News.

The council has made several amends to its proposal but so far is still pressing ahead with its plans to charge for parking.

The latest proposal, put forward last month, is for 30 minutes free parking at either end of the High Street, north of Vicarage Lane and south of Langley Hill, with the area between the two roads costing 80p for 30 minutes and £1.50 for an hour, payable by app – with no return within two hours. Under this proposal parking in both car parks would remain free but be restricted to four hours.

The current restrictions are free parking for one hour on the High Street, and no return within two hours, between 8:30 and 18:30. The car parks are free all day.

Borough Councillors Alan Anderson and Alan Johnson have spoken against the proposals on behalf of residents and traders, most recently at the Finance Scrutiny Committee.

Cllr Johnson said 'We are not opposed to a charging regime, but the very short periods of time permitted for parking will encourage a rather manic version of 'supermarket sweep' as residents and visitors try to get some shopping and have a coffee or go for a meal with friends in less than an hour.'

The consultation will take place between 6 May and 28 May 2024 and, if passed, parking restrictions will go ahead in November 2024. To add your signature to the petition opposing this plan visit *bit.ly/kl-parking*

After a brainstorming session in The Old Palace with a small team of choir members in early January, the Community Choir launched a new website.

The brief was simple: to showcase the choir in an elegant, concise and simple way and to have a members page updated regularly with information about rehearsals and forthcoming performances. The resulting website, *kingslangleychoir.co.uk* features the choir's new logo and speaks for itself.

The choir performed at the Beaconsfield Festival of Choirs on Saturday 2 March. This was a noncompetitive choral festival of four concerts spread throughout the day made up of six choirs in each concert.

The set list for Kings Langley comprised a gospel number *People Get Ready* followed by a composition by local group the Staves called *Wisely and Slow* and concluded with a rousing rendition of Queen's *Somebody to Love.* At the end of the concert all the choirs joined together to sing a song specially commissioned for the festival called *Trees*, based on a classic poem by Rudyard Kipling.

Does anyone have a number for King Canute?

Another year, another round of flooding at Sunderlands Yard allotments, and allotment holders and the parish council are looking for help from any quarter to bring this to an end. However, there may be a little light at the end of the tunnel.

A recent site meeting between allotment holders, the Parish Council and the County Council's Bridges Team established that detritus flowing into a tributary off the canal between Concept House and The Dock, blocks the free flow of water through the culvert at Home Park Mill Link Road. This causes problems along both the canal and the River Gade, causing water to permeate through the ground at Sunderlands Yard, ruining the plants and vegetables.

Photographic evidence shows that a floating bund, used to prevent detritus flowing into it from the canal, has been removed, but it is not clear by who. 'The County Council is going to check with their legal team and Land Registry to identify who is responsible for the land either side of the tributary,' explained Councillor Alan Johnson. 'Once that has been established, they will be asked to reinstate the floating bund to avoid blockages in the future.'

In the meantime allotment holders are keeping their fingers crossed – and their wellingtons on!



It will be Carnival time soon!

Neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night will stop the Kings Langley Carnival from taking place on Saturday 22 June on the common. That, at least, is the motto of the Carnival Committee!

This year there will be some very different performers on the stage and a new focus on some local charities.

'However, it is not only about the entertainment on stage,' said Carol Chandler, Chair of the organising committee. 'We try to offer a wide range of things to do away from the stage, which includes welcoming some commercial stalls selling their own merchandise and food, and providing the opportunity for local charities and groups to make some money and raise awareness of the valuable work or activities they do every other day of the year.'

Christian Aid Village Quiz: delighted to have raised £820


The annual village Christian Aid Quiz took place on 9 February at the Services Club when 13 teams came together from a wide variety of groups in the village to share a lively evening.

Owl nesting boxes finally installed

Three tawny owl nesting boxes, purchased by the Parish Council in 2023, have now been put up in woodland around the village.

Rockliffe Avenue resident Mike Sands made the suggestion of owl boxes to the Parish Council some time ago. The Parish Council approved the idea, sourced the boxes and worked with Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust in finding suitable locations. Dacorum Borough Council has now supported the project by installing the boxes, and as tawny owls nest in springtime there is hope that one may choose to 'move in'!

The nesting boxes will be monitored to check for signs of use and hopefully will attract residents in due course.

Residents Association delays celebrations to focus on Rectory Farm Public Inquiry

In our last issue we reported on Kings Langley & District Residents Association's planned February celebration of successes in the battle against green belt development.

Unfortunately KL&DRA have had to postpone the event, in order to concentrate efforts and finances on fighting the appeal lodged by the developers Angle Property & Cala Homes against the refusal of their application for 135 homes on the greenbelt at Rectory Farm.

Gary Ansell, KL&DRA's Chairman, said 'Unfortunately, due to the timing of the appeal and subsequent Public Inquiry, we've had to postpone our celebrations. KL&DRA, jointly with CPRE Hertfordshire, the countryside charity, has been successful in applying to be a party at the Public Inquiry, which will start on Tuesday 9 April, and we have instructed a planning consultant and barrister to act for us.



'We aim to present arguments from a village perspective to support Dacorum Borough Council's refusal of planning permission and stop the greenfield site being covered with new homes. Our village cannot take the additional stress on its infrastructure and services, having already taken a number of other local brownfield developments. Stopping building on the green belt is essential and, if Rectory Farm goes, none of the other green fields around our village will be safe from development.' KL&DRA need to raise £20,000 to pay for the professional services required to take part in the Public Inquiry and, whilst fundraising is going well, there is still a way to go to hit the target.




Another accolade for 1st Homecare?

Michael has almost completed the draft of the second book in a possible series of five.


