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Altar's 19th century ornamental screen restored at All Saints

Visitors to All Saints church often go to visit the tomb of Edmund of Langley and many are also drawn to the beautiful, carved reredos – the ornamental screen that covers the wall running along behind the altar.

However, wear and tear means the reredos were in need of some attention, and last month All Saints brought in David Britnell,a specialist in church and historic building restoration, to restore the 20 or more damaged pieces.

Over a week David took moulds and fitted the replacement pieces, ageing the new parts to ensure they blended in with the existing reredos.

Carved by Joseph Clarke in 1878, and sponsored by paper mill owner John Dickinson, the reredos are now back to their best, and visitors are challenged to try and spot where the repairs have been made!

Residents in Langley Lodge Lane were confronted by the remains of a light aircraft high up in the trees and a multitude of emergency vehicles blocking their access for more than three hours. Fortunately, despite the carnage and smouldering debris, there were no real injuries – the dramatic scenario was just a very realistic training exercise for Hertfordshire's fire, police and ambulance services.

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Green fingers rewarded at competition evening

The culmination of this year's Gardens Competition took place at Kings Langley Cricket Club where everyone was a winner without a ball being bowled.

'It was another great year for judging,' explained Councillor Alan Johnson, 'and we were delighted so many of this year's winners were able to join us for the celebrations.'

Before the presentations got underway there was an opportunity for a 'Gardener's Question Time' with Craig Brace, Head of Horticulture at the Sunnyside Trust. Pam Litton, a local gardener and British wildlife expert, was also on hand to talk about the eight swift boxes purchased by the parish council, and sought volunteers to help in identifying suitable locations around the village.

Sadly, swifts, which fly to the UK from Africa in the spring to breed, have declined in number by more than 50% over two decades.

There were regular entrants and first time participants this year, with Marion Cox winning Best Contemporary Garden and, with Allen Bentley, Best Overall Garden for 2024. At the other end of the scale, Glenda Seal won Best Newcomer with a garden that had a little of everything.

As is traditional, there was a wonderful buffet provided by Dallings and, at the end of the evening, a raffle and auction which raised £340 for the Sunnyside Trust.



'Once again it seemed like everyone was a winner in the raffle or the auction,' added Chief Judge Councillor Gerry Angiolini. 'There was a fabulous selection of raffle prizes and planters, a picnic set and petrol in the auction!'

Lottery award will fund raised beds at allotment site

Kings Langley Allotments and Gardens Association (KLAGA) has been awarded £16,730 by the Lotteries Community Fund towards a Raised Bed project at its Sunderlands Yard site in Kings Langley.

The site at Sunderlands Yard is situated between the River Gade and the Grand Union Canal, which in recent vears has seen increased flooding caused from excess water levels in both the canal and river.

The Association, with the support of the Kings Langley Parish Council who own the allotment site, has been in discussion with the Canal and River Trust, the Environment Agency, Herts County Council, and Dacorum Borough Council for several years, but progress has been slow

The programme will see a hundred raised beds installed across the site. As part of their bid, KLAGA will be hosting an Open Day next year when they will be showcasing the benefits this project will bring to their allotment community.



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Comedian kicks off Christmas at village school

Village News brainiac secures Masters in Maths at 75

A friend of *Village News* is celebrating after graduating with a Masters degree more than 50 years after he was first invited to undertake the qualification.


Andrew Selby, long-time Kings Langley resident and setter of the *Village News* Crossword since the magazine's inception, is celebrating after securing a Masters in Mathematics from the Open University at the age of 75.

And he is no stranger to higher education, having already completed a BSc in Civil Engineering in 1971, one in Mathematics in 2004 and a third in Natural Sciences in 2017.

The retired civil engineer, who spent much of his career working for Thames Water, was first approached about studying for a Masters in Civil Engineering after his first degree in the early seventies, but familial duty called.

He said 'I turned it down as Marguerite and I wanted to marry and to buy a house, which would not have been viable on the grant offered for the two year course. However, I think I squirrelled the thought away in my mind somewhere as a lifetime goal for when I became older!'

Andrew and his wife Marguerite spend much of their spare time supporting the Kings Langley Community Library, with Andrew using his digital expertise. He recently set his 314th crossword for *Village News* and its predecessor *The Villager* – which launched in 1992 – something he finds deeply satisfying.

But he always found time for his studies. He told *Village News* 'The most challenging part of the Masters were at times just keeping going, with thoughts of "why am I doing this", but fortunately determination prevailed. Marguerite has been a tremendous support while I've been studying, but I think now is breathing a small sigh of relief.'

And the grandfather of six is not entirely sure he's ready to stop studying. He said 'I'm undecided at the moment on undertaking further formal study. However I will continue working with my son's father in law – a retired Sydney-based neurologist – developing a joint paper on understanding and modelling consciousness.'

Recent years have seen young girls aspiring to emulate female heroes such as Chloe Kelly and Alessia Russo, who were finally afforded a level of media exposure previously restricted to their male counterparts. Equality is still yet to be achieved, but progress in the women's game has been sharp and this has been reflected at Kings Langley Football Club.

The start of the year saw the beginning of the club's partnership with HealthyU Girls Football Academy, which is part of HealthyU Women's Gym in Hemel, and the girls' section is now represented by the most teams in the club's history.

Additionally, a groundbreaking move has seen Kings enter an all-girls team, the Kings Langley Under-11 Whites, into the West Herts Youth League- a predominantly boys' league - for the first time.

Karl Thomas has joined as Head of Girls Football, combining the role with his existing one as HealthyU's director, and he is passionate in his support of the movement.

Kings are offering unprecedented opportunities for young, aspiring female footballers and a vastly increased number of teams provides large numbers of girls a chance to begin their dreams and a career in the sport at the club.

New pitch officially opened as football gets boost in Kings Langley

A Football Development Programme designed to broaden the reach of the sport had a moment in the spotlight recently when High Sheriff of Hertfordshire Annie Brewster JP officially opened the floodlit 3G football pitch at Kings Langley School (KLS).

The initiative, which is part of the High Sheriff's Fund run by Hertfordshire Community Foundation, includes supporting local clubs to increase the number of female teams, to create opportunities for players with a disability and collectively providing pandisability football at junior, youth and senior level.

There is also the Monday night walking football team for those who thought their playing days were behind them.

The 3G pitch was built following a grant of over £700,000 from the Football

Foundation as well as an additional £290,000 from a number of local organisations including the school itself, the football clubs in Kings Langley and Chipperfield, and the Parish and County Councils.



Berkhamsted-based Hector's House was created in memory of Hector Stringer, who took his life in 2011 at the age of 18. Set up by Hector's parents, Robert and Belinda, the charity aims to prevent suicide and mental health stigma through education, awareness and support.

In the week building up to the game, KLFC marked the new partnership by turning its social media green to help raise awareness of the charity and, ahead of the game, the first team warmed up in bright green Hector's House T-Shirts. A minute's silence was also observed before kick off in honour of people who suffered – and still suffer – from mental health issues.

Despite a 0-2 loss to a highlyorganised Thame United, the bigger picture of the fixture was to promote the importance of the charity, raising awareness and providing support to anybody who needs to speak out about how they are feeling.

Club chairman Darren Eliot said 'It truly is a privilege to work with Hector's House. This partnership has the potential to reach so many people across the club, from our young people right the way through to supporters of our first team and it's such an important message.'

Emergency scenario played out at Kings Langley farm

On a murky Monday morning in October six fire engines, four ambulances, five police cars, a Hazardous Area Response Team, an Emergency Critical Care team and an Environmental Health field team were all involved in an operation code-named 'Helo' which brought together emergency services from across the county.

In a setting which was created to represent an event which was as trueto-life as possible, they were faced with a situation which could well be a possibility given our location beneath local and national flight paths.

Nearly six months in the planning, the operation was brought to Langley Lodge Farm by Graham Glover, Multi Agency Training & Exercise Coordinator.

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'Emergency service agencies and partner organisations regularly take part in training exercises to test our plans for handling a particular kind of incident and ensure that our teams have the skills and experience to respond to these events,' he said. 'This exercise was a challenging scenario and provided an opportunity for us to work together.'

The scenario included a 'crashed' aeroplane and pilot casualties, a damaged caravan with dazed and injured occupants, a small fire, a hazardous milk tanker and an 'irate farmer', all requiring prioritising for urgent specialist attention.

The aim of the exercise was to test the plans of all emergency services and their partners in responding to incidents together, to ensure public safety in the event of an aviation incident.

Area Commander Andy Hall, of the Hertfordshire Fire and Rescue Services said 'Testing and exercising our skills in extreme situations allows us to ensure that we are always fully prepared to protect the public in any situation, no matter how rare.'

Just as in any real-life situation, crews who turned out on the day were unaware of the precise details of the situation until they were on the scene. In this instance, police were first initially despatched to the scene and contacted their control room to request appropriate emergency support.

Chief Inspector Andrew Palfreyman,

Three Rivers Local Policing Command, said 'We set up a Tactical Command Group in our Major Incident Room at police headquarters in Welwyn Garden City. Our emergency service responders and partners worked together, talking through the issues and sharing information' Photographic drones were also employed to relay activities to the Incident Room in real time.

Paramedics working in senior roles in the NHS as day jobs. The clinicians volunteer their days off as part of the BHECCS charity, supporting the NHS ambulance service to bring extra care to patients (which is usually only found in hospital) to the most seriously injured and unwell patients, giving them the best possible chance of survival and recovery.

Their new vehicle carries lifesaving drugs, equipment and treatment not usually found on an emergency ambulance.

Speaking to the *Village News*, Sarah Watson, Head of Communications and Engagement for Hertfordshire Fire & Rescue Service said 'We had a facilitator on the scene, noting how

the emergency teams had responded and how well they were working together. We rigorously analyse the day's performance at exercises such as this, always learning, always seeking to constantly improve our work. We need to ensure that we are ready and prepared ahead of when we could be tested in the future.'

Nicola said 'Grief touches us all in one way or another and in today's society so many people grieve alone when that is absolutely not how it should be. The Good Grief Café is a space for people to grieve in community, to talk to each other, to find support and comfort and to simply feel less alone.

'Grief can be the passing of a partner, friend or family member but it can also be grieving for a life you have lost, whether that is a diagnosis for you or your spouse, an unwanted change in circumstances, or even simply the expectation that you should have moved on from a grief you first experienced a long time ago. Grief is not a one size fits all experience; the only thing that should be universal is the opportunity not to grieve alone.'

The Rector's Reflections: A note from Father James McDonald

This September saw the return of our increasingly popular Beer and Fizz Festival. Huge thanks must go to the Festival committee of Chris Hughes, Sarah Wragg, Simon Pilling, Jamie Brockhurst, Steve Parry and Kevin Yelland, who organized a brilliant, fun, inclusive, and very successful community event.

We saw lots of returning faces as well as many new ones, including people who are new to the village. We received lots of positive comments about the festival: the atmosphere, the range of beers, the use of the church as a unique setting, the food and music on offer – people told us they look forward to the Festival as a highlight of the village calendar.

I was struck by the number of conversations I had with people at the Beer Festival about how they would love to come to church, or come back to church, but the pressures of life, especially Sunday sport for families, make it nearly impossible.

Well, I hear you. And I am perfectly willing to offer a service at a different time if there are enough people who would commit to coming. So, to help me find out, please scan the QR code to head to a short survey where you can tell me the times that would work for you, and what you would like to see in a service, for adults, and for your children, where applicable.

We would continue with Sunday morning church as it is, fear not, but I'd love to see if we can find a way to help those for whom that doesn't work start, or re-start attending.

You may wonder why All Saints was holding a Beer Festival at all, and whether it's even allowed. Well, if you came along and read the intro in the programme, you'll know it definitely is allowed – the association between church and beer goes back centuries. But the 'why' may still be unclear.

It's for two main reasons. The first and most important reason is to welcome

the wider community into the church for a fun, relaxed and accessible event. All Saints is your parish church, whether you worship there or not. You are welcome in it and it is here for you.

Secondly, it is a fundraising event for All Saints – now the most important fundraising event in our calendar – and enables us to make significant donations to other charities. We receive no funding from the government or from the central church and are responsible for raising the nearly £100,000 a year required to keep the church going. This comes mainly through regular planned giving by congregation members and supporters, and through fundraising.

But there is something more important than both these things. Those of us who worship regularly, who organise the fundraisers and give regularly to keep the church going, want to ensure the church is at the heart of the community now and into the future. And, to ensure there is a future beyond the present congregation, your parish church needs you!

Village fireworks paused for 2024

The village's Christmas lights switch on will be without the annual firework display this year after the withdrawal of a major sponsor from the event.

Kings Langley Parish Council have decided to cancel the firework display due to increasing costs to the council and a reluctance to splurge residents money on such an expensive moment.

Council Chairman Howard Button said 'The annual Christmas Lights Festival draws people from Kings Langley and its surrounding villages every year, and all the other activities – funfair, stalls, Santa and his elves, late night opening for many of the local, independent shops, local choirs performing and, of course, the wonderful Christmas Lights – will still be happening.

'However, committee members acknowledged that, despite financial support from some local traders, this year it did not cover the shortfall. We felt on this occasion the mounting costs falling on the public purse were not a reasonable use of residents' money.'

The council said the decision was not taken lightly and acknowledged it would be disappointing for some residents but stressed the switch-on event would still be as memorable as ever. Cllr Alan Johnson said, 'We will be reviewing this year's event early in the New Year, including the associated costs, to see how to take forward this hugely popular event in 2025.'

The Kings Langley Christmas Lights Festival takes place on Saturday 23 November in the High Street. The road will be closed from 12noon, the stalls and other associated activities will start at 3pm and run through until 6pm. The road will re-open once everything has been cleared and it is safe to do so.

From Kings Langley Methodist Church

Almost ten years ago we challenged ourselves to come up with an alternative Sunday Service which might attract people who find morning services difficult, or perceive them as 'not for me'.

We eventually decided to embark on a monthly afternoon *Songs of Praise*. Some were sceptical about its long-term success which led us to experiment over a six-month period.

We have now met 77 times and nearly 70 different people have chosen and introduced hymns. All have come with a story, personal recollections, fascinating insights and background information – although no-one has been denied their choice through being shy about speaking in public.

So far, we have clocked up 230 different hymns/songs and at our 50th service, we counted down the 'top 10' – with some surprising results.

We have regular attendees from a variety of churches, together with folk who have little church background or experience. Each month we seem to see new faces. New friendships have been forged and a special fellowship established.

Our initial 'six-month experiment' has certainly proved a success and Songs of Praise is now well-established. If you'd like to join us, you'd be very welcome at 3pm on the last Sunday of the month – 24 November and 29 December are the next two

Science student wins rare place on ocean research mission

A GeoPhysics student from Kings Langley has returned from a six week research expedition to the North Atlantic Ocean off Iceland after being hand picked to join the team of eminent scientists.



my degree. On the expedition I was able to deploy instruments to collect and interpret crucial seismic data to inform our research.

'I learnt how to use three new industrylevel software packages, and about operations at sea and their challenges. I learnt what's needed to get 55 people on such a research expedition. Most importantly, I learnt how crucial it is to have seismic data of our ocean floors."

Aryan Shah, 21, was the only undergraduate researcher among the party who were working on mapping the seafloor and collecting crucial data to study past environmental changes.

The student, who is in his fourth and final year at Imperial College London, is a passionate advocate of the world's oceans and their importance. He has a startup company, InX Tech, which pioneers the development of hydrogen powered submersibles to map the seafloor.

Aryan told Village News 'The expedition was a fantastic opportunity to apply what I have learnt during

As if the loss of Rectory Farm was not bad enough, a combination of the Government's mandatory housing targets and changes to the planning system, which includes removing protection from development in some parts of our Green Belt, will mean substantial changes to the character and setting of Kings Langley.

Because of the Government-led changes, Dacorum Borough Council (DBC) and Three Rivers District Councils (TRDC) are being forced to add more development sites into their Local Plans in order to try and meet the targets for new homes, and our options to object have become very limited.

500+ homes at Shendish have been added to DBC's plan, which will be published for public consultation between 4 November and 17 December 2024. Please watch out for publication of the consultation details and make sure you have your say.

TRDC's draft plan has been pulled and will be revised with new sites added. but will not be ready for consultation until 2026.

The KL&DRA will continue to do all they can to fight development on our Green Belt, but the battle has got considerably harder. For more information go to www. greenbeltmatters.com




