Call for urgent review of new parking rules

Weeks after parking restrictions were introduced on the high street and in the two car parks, some shopkeepers are calling for a halt to the fees and time limitations while the matter is reviewed.

As well as concerns the charges are putting off customers, business owners say they are struggling with the issue of parking for themselves and their staff, who require far more than the four hour limit now imposed in both The Nap and Langley Hill car parks.

There has also been outrage at news that doctors who work out of

Kings Langley Surgery in The Nap are having to move their cars in the middle of clinic hours, and workers at funeral directors Tadmans were told to pay 80p to park their hearse outside the business while they loaded a coffin ahead of a funeral. There are also regular issues with school coaches unable to get up Langley Hill due to cars parked on both sides of the road, narrowing the space.

As *Village News* went to press Sally Symington, the newly elected leader of Dacorum Borough Council, released a statement saying 'I'm grateful to residents, local businesses, town and parish councils and traders' associations for the feedback on the changes to the car parking charges across the borough.

'I've spoken to Cabinet colleagues and agreed we will ask for a review of the policies, in consultation with local businesses and residents.'

However Jeff Folkins, co-owner of Dalling&Co, said more was needed. 'I am very encouraged that Sally Symington is engaged – she's visited the High Street and is invested in exploring compromises – but whilst there is promise of a review we need these rules suspended now for 90 days while this review is being undertaken.'

Stephen Hunt, director of So Soft Designs, said 'This needs to be an issue that is prioritised for the livelihood of the village now – it is time critical. The longer it goes on the sooner shops will shut. We haven't got time.'

Two residents of St Laura's Care Home have been sharing their memories of the Second World War to mark the 80th anniversary of VE Day.

Barbara Brown (above) and Joyce Goulborn (right), who both turn 102 this year, served their country in the war and remember Victory in Europe Day on 8 May 1945 when Germany surrendered its armed forces.

Joyce, who served in the Auxiliary Territorial Service (ATS), told *Village News* 'When the end of the war was declared I came off duty and went with a friend to the railings outside Buckingham Palace where we watched

After spending a couple of years trying to volunteer for the war effort, but being stopped by her father, Joyce was quick to step forward once the age limit was lowered to 20. In one post she was charged with standing on a flat roof in London with the instruction to blow a whistle if she saw a Doodlebug approaching head on. However, after two false alarms – because Joyce wasn't sure what the German V1 flying bomb looked like – she was relieved of that responsibility.

Barbara, meanwhile, joined the Land Army and was stationed in Oxford, growing food at a large girls' school in London from which everyone had been evacuated.

She said 'I chose to stay in school when war was declared but was then called up which meant I was owed a year's free education. So after VE Day I went to Heatherley School of Fine Art in London.'

Both ladies remember rationing continuing for some time and don't recall much noticeable change between their lives immediately before

and after VE day. Joyce was sent to Devon to continue teaching secretarial skills until she was discharged, while Barbara enjoyed student life in London.

Joyce went on to work for Kodak and lived in Hemel Hempstead with her husband Douglas and two sons, while Barbara and her husband Bernard

moved to Kings Langley where their three sons attended the Rudolf Steiner School.

Kings Langley School is pioneering an innovative new approach to staff wellbeing through a weekly art initiative led by professional artist and Principal Assistant Headteacher, James Tubb.

Every Thursday afternoon from 3.30pm, members of staff gather for relaxed, engaging sessions in oil painting, with a particular focus on creating original portrait artwork.

Far from being just an art class, this initiative is rooted in the belief that creativity is a powerful vehicle for mental health and personal wellbeing. James was motivated to provide staff with sessions that highlight how artistic activities – whether for fun, self-expression, or relaxation – can significantly enhance one's emotional resilience, reduce stress, and foster a sense of connection.

Studies show that engaging in creative activities can reduce anxiety, boost serotonin, and promote emotional resilience. By offering staff the chance to immerse themselves in painting, James is taking a proactive and progressive step toward supporting his colleagues' mental health. He explained how 'it's a time to unwind, reconnect with ourselves and our colleagues, and simply be creative.'

Colleagues from all departments and levels take part, whether seasoned creatives or complete beginners. The shared experience of painting allows for new relationships to be formed and existing ones to deepen - something often lost in the hustle of the school day.

Centenary celebration for Bowling Club

Kings Langley Bowling Club is marking 100 years with a series of celebrations and the raising of a centenary flag.

KLBC was formed in 1925 when the green was the lawn of founder member Dr Reginald Fisher. Another founder member was Walter Kingham who ran a printing works in the village. They were soon joined by Edward Toms, the local school master. These names are still familiar in Kings Langley thanks to Fisher Close and Toms Lane.

In 1930 the club moved to a new Three Rink site (now the Telephone Exchange opposite the entrance to the current green) and was affiliated to both the Watford & District and Hertfordshire Bowls Associations. They moved again, in 1973, to their present location. In 1976 their Pavilion was extended thanks to benefactor Jack Arthur, and a further extension to the Pavilion in 1983 gave increased kitchen space and changing rooms.

In 1995 steps were taken to further upgrade the facilities and in recent years many improvements have been made including installation of an Automatic Green Watering System and Visitors Changing Room, complete paving of the Green Surrounds, and the construction of New Flower Beds areas.





Thanks to financial help from members, Dacorum Council, KL Parish Council, and Beechwood Homes, the latest extension to the club house was completed in 2000, the club's 75th Anniversary year.

During this Centenary year improvements are being made to extend the outdoor seating area.

Scout Sam awarded highest accolade

A dedicated teen from 1st Kings Langley Scouts has been accorded the King's Scout Award, the highest award available to young people within Scouting.

Sam Penn was handed the award by the Lord-Lieutenant of Hertfordshire alongside three other Explorers with whom he completed his expeditions. The King's Scout Award is the final award in a series of Chief Scout's Awards and takes several years of dedication and effort to complete.

Sam completed all sections of his Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award, along with some additional requirements under International, Community and Values themes.

As part of the challenge Sam undertook a year of weekly volunteering as a Young Leader with one of 1st Kings Langley's Cub packs, worked towards his third Dan Black Belt in Taekwondo, and spent six months



learning skills in vehicle maintenance to fulfil requirements in the required areas. His qualifying expedition took him to Snowdonia for a four day trip where the group reached the summit of Snowdon (pictured above), navigating and walking in challenging conditions.

They also came to the aid of a team of their younger peers who were completing their own DofE expedition on the mountain that day.

Finally, a five day residential experience with a group of unfamiliar participants and leaders completed the Gold DofE. Sam chose to complete this with The Raptor Foundation in Huntingdon, spending his time learning to care for birds of prey and their habitats.



Beating the Bounds is the ancient annual practice of walking around the Parish boundary on Rogation Sunday (the fifth Sunday after Easter).

Rooted in medieval times the practice sees community members walk the boundaries of their parish, serving to reinforce community identity and knowledge of land ownership before the widespread use of maps.

Walk leader, Cllr Alan Anderson said 'The walk passes through beautiful countryside, but it also involves a busy road junction, a padlocked gate and private land, so it has to be organised as a group walk. The whole walk is nine miles long (with escape routes), and there are no facilities on the route, so adequate walking footwear, clothing and provisions – including a packed lunch – are required.'

How to park legally in and around the High Street

The Nap and **Langley Hill** car parks, both a minute's walk from the shops, remain FREE of charge but are now restricted to a maximum of 4 hours.

You must register your vehicle for your free parking hours. You can do this either by entering your vehicle's number plate at the machine or by using the PayByPhone app.

Once you've downloaded the app and added your car registration number, it's quick and easy to use thereafter. You must enter your location code: **810391:** The Nap car park (max 4 hours free parking) **810392:** Langley Hill car park (max 4 hours free parking) **810378:** High Street on-street bays

Between Langley Hill and Vicarage Lane Mon-Sun, between 8am – 6pm

£0.80 for 30 minutes £1.50 for 60 minutes (maximum stay)

Payable by using the PayByPhone app as above.

Either end of the High Street

There are some additional free parking bays at both ends of the High Street, but with a maximum stay of 30 minutes only.

Please note that the PayByPhone app is automatically set to send you text notifications at £0.20 per park. This is optional. To avoid this charge please go to 'settings' in the app, then 'parking notifications', and turn them off.

When using the app there is an extra £0.05 charge per transaction.

Disabled parking

No change here – Blue badge holders can park in the designated bays while displaying their badge, without registering their car to park, for an unlimited amount of time.

Shopkeepers call for urgent

Business owners in the village have welcomed the council leader's commitment to request a review of the new parking policy, but say it's not enough to save them from possible disaster.

Sian Turner – Home and

Garden said 'My overall feeling is that it needs to be a simpler process – it needs to be the same along the entire high street, with an hour or half

an hour free, and machines for people who can't or don't want to use the app.

'Parking isn't as easy for shop workers but as a result there are more spaces available which makes it far easier for the shopper to find a spot, and the car parks are free – and not that far out!'




Richard Smith – **The Langley Butcher:** 'When the parking charges started it was the worst fortnight

charges started it was the worst fortnight I've had in this shop. People were arriving frustrated and cross

and we were dealing with all that but having to be diplomatic about it.

'We know for years people have been using the car parks to go to the station because by 9am they were full and no shops were open. So it's a Godsend for that, but it's been done wrong – the council haven't explained it well and they've got no machines, just an app.'



Hannah Coleman – Red House Dental:

'We've had patients arrive in tears because they can't work out how to use the app. Appointments have been delayed or missed because people have had trouble with parking, and while we always aim to keep appointments on time inevitably they can run over, delaying the next patient who may only have put a certain amount on the car.

'It should be one hour free with options for longer. We weren't told when it was going to start – it was a terrible way to have done it. It just seems to be very greedy.'



'They've done this in Harpenden and the village is empty as a result – the town council is now taking St Albans Council to court and I can't blame them. I

certainly wouldn't rule out legal action against Dacorum. It's destructive, not practical, and people need to protest.

'Parking is critical here – people pop down for essentials and then call in other places. In our case people can't pick fabric for curtains when they have a time pressure. We're not saying there shouldn't be any restrictions because some people [abuse it], but maybe having an hour or 30 minutes free then start paying a little would stop the long term parkers.'

Jeff Folkins – Dalling&Co:

'The bureaucrats in Dacorum Borough Council decided what was going to happen without speaking to us. We had more than 3,500 people sign a petition and it was counted as one objection; we were later told people should have objected individually on an online portal. How can they say that's fair? It's a whitewash. They made it as hard as possible to object.

'The Parish Council gave us as much support as they could and lobbied hard but seem to have been largely ignored.

'At a time when our business rates have gone up 166% they're now trying to reduce footfall with parking charges. So they've put rates up and impacted our ability to make money.

'They've done the same in Tring and Berkhamsted but Kings Langley is vastly different. We are far more akin to Bovingdon where there's two hours free and Sundays free – why haven't they done that here? I haven't got a problem with charges – I've argued this for a decade – but I would certainly like to see the council making more than 24% they are getting now. As a

Councillor added 'The High Street hasn't changed, the brilliant local shops haven't changed, but the ridiculous limit of no more than one hour in the centre of the village is ludicrous. Instead of listening to local residents, retailers or elected councillors, the Borough Council has simply pressed ahead with a "we know best," approach for Dacorum.

'Suggestions about permits for local workers, increasing the 'free' period to an hour and then charging thereafter – we took our arguments to the decision makers time and again – all were refuted. *Village News* first highlighted the proposals 17 months ago!

Developer's attempt to abandon green space promise

A house building company that pledged to include community green space in its development of Rectory Farm has been lambasted for reneging on the deal by those who fought its initial planning application.

CALA Homes won planning permission to build 135 properties on Green Belt land at an appeal last autumn after promising a dedicated green space to be owned and managed by local charity, Sunnyside Rural Trust, for the benefit of the wider community and as employment for local vulnerable people.

However, CALA Homes recently submitted new planning applications* to Dacorum Borough Council which had removed the environment-focused benefits in order to 'allow for a more efficient, cost-effective and sustainable management of the area'.

The changes included removing the bridges on the site; planting very young whips instead of semi-mature trees as agreed, reducing the amount of open space; reducing the area of the swale (a shallow channel to reduce the risk of flooding); and removal of fishing and viewing platforms along the canal.

Group raises development concerns with MP Gagan Mohindra

Members of the Kings Langley and District Residents Association (KL&DRA) committee met local MP Gagan Mohindra, to discuss six key issues affecting our village.

The proposed Hill Farm development with the lack of infrastructure and increased traffic was raised. There were also concerns about Shendish in DBC's Local Plan submission, and that hundreds of homes at Numbers Farm may be added back into Three Rivers draft Local Plan.

Appeal for return of bobbies on the beat Parishioners have said they feel more fearful of crime in the village in recent years and have called for an increase in police patrols to address the issue.

At the Kings Langley Parish Council APM last month more than 150 people turned out to listen to various community representatives speak, including Jonathan Ash-Edwards, Hertfordshire's Police and Crime Commissioner.

Concerns were raised by a number of attendees about the sense of unease they feel after a perceived increase in domestic and commercial burglaries, car thefts and drug dealing in the area. One said she believed criminals target Kings Langley because it is 'affluent and a soft touch'.

Another told *Village News* 'As a resident in the village for over ten years, the increase in crime rates is a worry, and one that I would anticipate is only likely to grow given the current circumstances of cost of living and a lack of support for those truly in need. 'A greater police presence, particularly around the station, and access points to the village, as well as at events such as the Carnival, could mitigate these criminal acts and allay residents' concerns. It would help build more positive relationships between the police and the younger people of the village.'

Members of the public also criticised the lack of visibility, and the struggles they have had identifying the village's dedicated police officer and PCSO.

Ash-Edwards, who had earlier addressed the meeting, said he would raise the issue with the Chief Constable of Hertfordshire police. He said 'I hear you loud and clear. Thank you for your feedback – I will relay your fears to the Chief Constable and get a plan put in place which will hold him to account.'


