# Keen gardeners sought to help in Village Garden

In Spring, a gardener's fancy turns to thoughts of what plants and shrubs should be on the shopping list, and when the early morning frost might depart to enable them to be planted.

The parish council adopts the same approach in the Village Garden next to All Saints Church, but relies on a band of volunteers to help keep the garden looking so beautiful.

Planting, pruning and weeding is required throughout the year to get a wide and colourful variety of flora and fauna safely in the ground. The volunteers traditionally meet on the first Friday of the month – although more weeding and pruning is always welcome. In addition, some of the volunteers are helping Tom Field to



reinstate the flint wall along Church Lane – but that does not include rebuilding the gates on Watford Road that Tom has just finished work on!

The Village Garden also recently had a visit from local arborists Bartletts, who carried out an inspection of trees to ensure they are safe, and to look for signs of disease or damage which may make them unstable. Some work will be carried out later in the year.



Despite threats of heavy rain and thundery showers, an intrepid band of volunteers Annette and Ann (pictured above) Terri and Alan, set about planting, pruning and weeding (as they do throughout the year) to get over 150 colourful varieties of plants and shrubs safely in the ground.



## Repair Shed to open at the Steiner School

Practically-minded older people can now learn new skills and share existing ones at the village's first Repair Shed.

Five years ago, as part of the development of the Kings Langley Neighbourhood Plan, the importance of social inclusion for men and women over 50 was identified as an important issue to address. The idea for a Repair Shed was developed, but after some structural and pandemic related delays at the original site, the trustees of the Rudolf Steiner School stepped forward. As a result, the new Repair Shed is due to open at the Langley Hill site any day now.

Parish Councillor Alan Johnson said 'Because we will be able to use a purpose-built classroom on the school site, it is already fitted out for teaching. The bonus is that those wonderful people at Community Action Dacorum believe they will also be able to cover more age ranges and days of the week, in addition to providing training in traditional skills.'

Repair Sheds – made famous by the BBC TV series The Repair Shop - provide a supportive environment in which people with an enthusiasm for working with their hands can do repairs, learn and share skills.

The 'Shedders' in Hemel Hemepstead spend about a third of their time on income generation through making items for sale and mending items that would otherwise go to landfill, another third on community projects (paid and unpaid) and the rest on their own personal projects.

#### A new coffee shop has opened in Kings Langley for people who want 'something a little different'.

Situated on Barnes Lane, a few minutes walk from the top of Coniston Road, Bea's Coffee Barn offers stunning countryside views across the valley.

Owner Callum Kelman said he hopes to attract people who want to escape from the hustle and bustle of the village. He said 'You could be anywhere in the world up here, it's a beautiful spot and can be very peaceful so I thought we'd open up for people to come and enjoy our views.'

The coffee shop, which serves hot and cold drinks and sweet treats, is on the site of Valley View Farm. From here Callum's father, Mark, runs J&CK9 Doggy Day Care, with his partner Jess.

Callum said 'I grew up around farming but I wanted to develop the farm in other ways. We hope to expand what we offer as we settle in but at the moment we're seeing a steady stream of visitors which is great.'

Bea's Coffee Barn is open Monday to Friday from 8am – 4.30pm and Saturdays from 10am –2.30pm.



# Wayside Farm's Charlie calls for visitors to be responsible

Charlie Wray, farmer and custodian of Wayside Farm, has called for visitors, walkers and nature enthusiasts to use the land responsibly.

Charlie recently celebrated 45 years at Wayside, a farm which has been in the ownership of Hertfordshire County Council since it was bought in 1919 to provide work for returning servicemen. He reflected that it was one of the best jobs in the world, and one that he had always enjoyed.

He said 'We are always delighted to welcome anyone who wants to see our dairy cows, enjoy a walk in the countryside or visit the Farm Shop, but we do need everyone to stay on marked paths, with any dogs on a lead, to protect our crops, our animals and our livelihood.'

Dalling

A small minority of people who walk through the fields rather than sticking to the paths, risk killing the crop wherever they tread. This grass

is the winter feed for the cattle and must not be treated as a country park.

WAYSIDE FARM

'It is so frustrating when there are plenty of footpaths, mostly separated by fencing from the fields,' added Charlie. 'The gates are for farm workers, not for general access or to provide a shortcut. Come and see us by all means, but please don't make things more difficult for this to carry on being a working farm for another 100 years.'

The Brilliant Film Academy is a school for 11–19 year olds that meets every Saturday from 11am – 2pm at Kings Langley School and puts 'learning by doing' at the forefront of its ethics. Run by professionals from the industry it provides hands-on practical skills, putting state of the art equipment in the hands of its students.

The Academy also offers work shadowing opportunities within film and production companies. This has led to a number of its students from both its Kings Langley and St Albans schools going on to gain apprenticeships in the industry or to study film direction and production at university.

The Film Academy is an offshoot of the long established Brilliant Theatre Academy of Performing Arts, which recently celebrated its 10th birthday, and meets every Friday in term time from 6 – 9pm, also at KLS. A weekend Dance Academy is also open to youngsters from school years 2 to 13.

However, Scouting is run almost entirely by volunteers, and requires plenty of adults to help run its Sections. The Group is urging anyone interested in helping to get in touch, when a visit can be arranged to one of the Sections weekly meetings to see what they get up to. No experience is necessary, just lots of enthusiasm!

There are currently around 100 members across Beavers, Cubs, and Scouts, and meetings are run almost every weeknight as well as camps, outings and weekend activities.

Jane Harding, Lead Volunteer for 1st Kings Langley, said 'The children who come to us, from Beavers through to Scouts, have the most incredible experiences, whether it's camping, cooking, crafts, skills for life, team work, or physical and outdoor activities. We are all about enabling youngsters to build confidence, try new things, make friends, and discover activities they may never otherwise have the opportunity to try.'

All volunteering is very flexible, is well supported by an existing Leader team and training is provided, much of which can be done online. First a quick update on the May County Elections – the Conservatives were knocked back into second place ahead of Reform but behind the Lib Dems who will now run a minority administration.

My deepest thanks to all who supported me on 1 May and, as your newly elected County Councillor, I will work my socks off for all of you in the village.

I am no longer the leader, but the past four years have been an incredible privilege to serve the whole county – thank you from the bottom of my heart for giving me that chance. In 2023 we were independently judged the best performing county in the country, so not all bad!

There are really important issues to resolve locally including High Street parking, building – especially in the Greenbelt – and getting the roads fixed.

The future of local government is in question – at the moment we have ten Borough Councils and a County Council with many Parish and Town councils.

The Government wants single Unitary Councils that do everything. So out goes Dacorum and other Borough Councils, out goes the County Council, 50 years old last year, replaced by a number of Unitary Councils (the village Parish Council would stay). Watch this space for further updates.

#### Graham Taylor remembered in Rectory Farm road name



#### The new road names in the Rectory Farm housing development have been revealed and each tip a nod to the area's history and setting.

Graham Taylor Way is in memory of the iconic footballer, manager, pundit and chairman of Watford Football Club – and village resident. Watson Way remembers Caroline Watson, founder of Parochial Marmalade, a local business at the turn of the 20th century whose profits were donated to charity.

Fairlands Way is inspired by Fairlands Valley Park in Stevenage, designated as the centre of recreation in the new town's planning with several manmade lakes in a chalk valley.

And finally, Rose Way and Castle Green are names derived from an association with canal boats.

## Police presence increases following public concerns

Kings Langley has had more visits from local police following concerns raised at the recent Annual Parish Meeting about the sense of unease felt after a perceived increase in domestic and commercial burglaries, car thefts and drug dealing in the area.

At that meeting Jonathan Ash-Edwards, Hertfordshire's Police and Crime Commissioner, said he would raise the issues with the Chief Constable of Hertfordshire.

Since then, the local Neighbourhood Policing Team (NPT), which focuses on solving neighbourhood issues such as anti-social behaviour and theft, has announced their new priorities for the coming months. In Kings Langley, the aim is to reduce antisocial behaviour and speeding on the high street. However, residents are encouraged to continue reporting crime and anti-social behaviour.

Parish Councillor Alan Johnson said, 'The increased police presence over recent weeks is very welcome. But if there are activities causing concern or low level anti-social behaviour that isn't being reported to the police, our local team won't know. The local police priorities are set every four months using data analysis and public feedback, so reporting to the local police is critical to influencing those priorities.'

In recent weeks PCs Robinson and Sweeting joined Parish Councillors for a meet and greet event with residents where attendees were able to discuss any concerns and get advice.

Whilst conducting foot patrols within Kings Langley officers came across a vehicle which had been parked in a dangerous position. It was seized, gaining much appreciation from passers-by. The Neighbourhood Policing Team has also been out conducting speed checks in Kings Langley over the past weeks. Villagers will see their team of police officers and community support officers working to tackle these issues with more police presence, events, and targeted enforcement. The area is also looked after by intervention officers who respond to emergency calls, the local crime unit which investigates serious crimes such as burglary, robbery, and assault, and specialist units that tackle acquisitive crime.

The team which covers Kings Langley and the surrounding areas is: Inspector Nick Ablett, Police Community Support Officer Paul Humphreys, PS Roger Akhtar, and PC Will Sweeting.

A local life-saving charity is appealing to volunteers to help ensure its essential work can continue. Essex & Herts Air Ambulance (EHAAT) provides critical emergency care to people in need.

Operating 24/7, 365 days a year, EHAAT's two helicopters and fleet of rapid response vehicles ensure that highly skilled teams reach patients quickly. Each critical care team consists of a pilot and co-pilot, a prehospital care doctor, and a critical care paramedic—bringing hospital-level emergency treatment straight to the scene.

In 2024 alone, EHAAT attended 1,745 patients across Essex, Hertfordshire, and the surrounding areas. However, this vital work is not NHS-funded and relies almost entirely on public donations. It costs £12 million a year to keep EHAAT flying and saving lives.

Volunteers play an essential role in keeping EHAAT operational. From assisting in charity shops and supporting community events to collecting donations and giving talks in schools, every volunteer helps sustain our mission.
